Characters

Roger’s Mother-The Wizard’s antagonist....the mother of baby Skunk.

The Owl-A character in the classic Roger story...a wise creature capable of solving any problem.

Bobby- Jack’s two-year-old son.

Introduction to the topic and the author.

- A celebrated American novelist, poet, short-story writer, art critic, literary critic.

- For his commendable literary achievements, he was popular worldwide and was honored with many awards like-The National Book Award, The Pulitzer Prize, St. Louis Literary Award, Ambassador Book Award, Fitzgerald Award for Achievement American Literature, Faulkner Award, Rea Award for the Short Story, National Book Critics' Circle Award and many more.

Steps to comprehensive explanations

a) The theme of Jack's Story

- Jack, the protagonist of the story, has been into the habit of telling bedtime stories to his beloved four –year old daughter – Joanne whom he calls by the pet name –Jo.
- The custom of story-telling started when Jo was only two years old.
- Every story narrated by Jack is a variation of the basic tale.
- Most of the stories revolve around the same plot concerning an animal named Roger.
- In every story, Roger used to be a different animal with some kind of problem.
- The story that time Jack tells his curious daughter is of Roger Skunk smelling awful as a result all other animals despise him and run away from him putting the poor little animal in solitude.

b) The Roger Skunk Story

- Disappointed, helpless Roger thinks of finding the solution to his problem
- With a heat of hope, he goes to the wise Owl to seek his advice and help, who in turn tells him to consult the Wizard.
- Advised by the Wise Owl, Roger Skunk reaches the Wizard's house and speaks out his problem
- The Wizard feels for Roger, uses his magical power.
- He takes out his magic wand and transforms the awful smell emitted from Roger Skunk's body to the smell of roses.
- Roger Skunk feels happy and overjoyed at the change of his body odor.
- All the woodland creatures who were hateful to Roger Skunk earlier now find his body odor quite pleasant and express their willingness to play with him and gather around

him, arousing a frenzied feel in him
