





Features of the Northern mountains

- Himalayas are the highest mountain ranges in the world.
- The Himalayas extend for 2500 kilometres from Jammu and Kashmir in the north to Arunachal Pradesh in the north-east.
- It is about 450 km wide in Kashmir.

- A major part of the mountain range of the Himalayas are in India.






The Himalayas consists of three mountain ranges that run parallel to each other.

- The Himadri or the Greater Himalayas
- The Himachal or the Middle Himalayas.
- The Shivalik or the Outer Himalayas



The Himadri or Greater Himalayas

- This is the northernmost range of the Himalayas.
- It is the highest of the three ranges, and contains all the highest peaks including Mount Everest.
- Most peaks in the Himadri remain permanently covered with snow.
- Kanchenjunga and Annapurna are two of the highest mountain peaks of these ranges.
- Kanchenjunga (8586 metres) is the highest peak in India.

- The second highest mountain peak in the world is Mount Godwin Austen also called K2.
- It is 8611 m high, and it lies in the Karakoram Range.
- The Karakoram lies north of the Himalayas.
- Moving sheets of ice are called glaciers.




- Several rivers such as the Ganga,Yamuna, Brahmaputra, Indus and Satluj arise from the Himadri.
- They arise from moving sheets of ice are called glaciers.
- As the glaciers move down to warmer regions, the ice melts, and gives rise to rivers.
- The river Ganga starts from the Gangotri glacier.
