Types of verbs -





Let's read the following sentences

- 1. Sanjana likes
- 2. Rohit wastes
- 3. I love
- 4. The Principal praised

Are they giving a complete sense to the sentences??

Let's read again

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- 1. Sanjana likes mangoes.
- 2. Rohit wastes food.
- 3. I love my mother.
- 4. The Principal praised the child.

The verbs in these sentences require/needs objects to complete their sense.

A verb that requires an object to complete its sense is called a transitive verb.

Points to remember and apply -



1. In a sentence there can be more than two objects.

Ex- Riya gave her friends a few books
transitive verb object
gave what? - a few books (object)

2. We can find the direct object by answering this question:

verb + what? = direct object

- 1. Manish walked.
- 2. The child cried
- 3. Kavita smiled
- 4. The river flowed

quite meaningful

The verbs in these sentences do not require/needs objects to complete their sense.

A verb that does not requires an object to complete its sense but makes good sense by itself is called an intransitive verb.

Transitive verbs need a direct object.

Example:

She wrote a letter.

verb direct object

Intransitive verbs don't need a direct object.

Example:

She wrote quickly.

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Students recognize that

- A transitive verb, used with a direct object, transmits action to an object and may also have an indirect object, which indicates to or for whom the action is done.
- In contrast, an intransitive verb never takes an object.



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
