
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Use of is, am, are, was, were



In present tense:

We use 'is' with singular nouns and pronouns.

We use 'are' with you, plural nouns and pronouns.

We use 'am' with I.

In past tense:

We use 'was' with singular with nouns and pronouns.

We use 'were' with you, plural nouns and pronouns.

We use 'was' with I.

Use of has, have



The words 'has' and 'have' link the naming part and the telling part of a sentence in present tense. They are used to indicate possession / ownership.

These words can also be used to ask questions.

In present tense:


We use 'has' with singular nouns and pronouns.

We use 'have' with plural nouns and pronouns.

We also use 'have' with I and you.

For Example:





Have

PRESENT TENSE

I / You / We / They and PLURAL NOUNS

I have a bike. You don't have a cat. We have a homework. They have a nice car.

Has

PRESENT TENSE

He / She / It and SINGULAR NOUNS

She has a cat. He has an exam. It has a good quality. She doesn't have a dog. We use 'had' when we want to indicate possession / ownership in the past time.



For Example:

Had

PAST TENSE

He had to go home. I had a meeting earlier. I thought you had quit. She hadn't eaten all day.
