Gerald Gould (1885 – 1936) was an English writer, known as a journalist and reviewer, essayist and poet. He was brought up in Norwich, and studied at University College, London and Magdalen College, Oxford. He had a position at University College from 1906, and was a Fellow of Merton College, Oxford from 1909 to 1916.



The poet has an inner urge to travel and go to new places, i.e. 'wander'. He likes to explore the unknown places and looks forward to gaining new experiences. He feels that the sun, the sky and nature in general is calling out to him for the same. Hence the title 'Wander Thirst' is very appropriate for the poem.

Beyond the East the sunrise, beyond the West the sea, And East and West the wander-thirst that will not let me be;

It works in me like madness, dear, to bid me say good-bye;
For the seas call,
And the stars call,
and oh! the call of the sky!
