INTRODUCTION TO THE STORY-TELLER



Born: 22 July 1881in London, England, UK Died: 4 September 1944 in Newyork City USA. Nationality: British Genres: Wrote children's literature – stories, poems etc. Margery Williams Bianco (22 July 1881 in London, England – 4 September 1944 in New York City, United States) was an English-American author, primarily of popular children's books. A professional writer since the age of nineteen, she achieved lasting fame at forty-one with the 1922 publication of the classic that is her best-known work, *The Velveteen Rabbit* (1922). She received the Newbery Honor for *Winterbound*.

THEME OF THE STORY



- It's the story of a child's toy who becomes Real
- Real is capitalized intentionally, but more on that later. The book cemented an otherwise unheralded writer's place in the children's literary canon, and has been read, loved, and passed on by generations since its publication in 1922.
- It's a simple, melancholy story with timeless appeal.





HOW LOVE MAKES US REAL – THE VELVETEEN RABBIT

- The story revolves around a stuffed toy
- A velveteen rabbit that is gifted to a boy on Christmas.
- When rabbit is introduced in the boy's nursery
- He realizes that he is a simple toy among the myriad of toys that are more sophisticated than him – having moving parts and operate on switches and batteries.
- The poor little rabbit was made to feel himself very insignificant, and the only person who was kind to him at all was the Skin Horse

 the oldest toy and hence the wisest one at the nursery. Love makes us Real.
- The love for one self and for others is what makes us Real. When we allow ourselves to be deeply affected by someone we are in essence, becoming more "Real" through our openness.
- Love is the mutual beholding of one another's realness.
