Lucio Rodrigues (1916-73) was a great Konkani essayist. He wrote several articles in English and Konkani to various periodicals and magazines. He served as a visiting professor of Folktale at many universities and also as a professor of English in Mumbai and Goa. His essays were posthumously published under the title 'Of soil and Soul' and 'Konkani Folktales'. Subtle, humble and informal narration are the essential features of his writings.




THEME OF THE STORY

IMPORTANCE O FBREAD IN TRADITIONAL CEREMONIES


