

Liam O' Flaherty was born on **28 August 1896 in Country Galway, Ireland.** He was an Irish novelist and short story writer and a major figure in Irish literary Renaissance. He breathed his last on 7 September 1984. He became very popular with his best selling novel 'The Informer' in 1925.
