Dad and the cat and the tree



Get Going A

1- Match the plans that dad hatched with the fate they met.

Ans: Plan A - fell in the flowered flower bed.

Plan B - branch broke, fell on his back.

Plan C - landed on the cat and got stuck on the tree.

2. How did dad try to save the cat the first time?

Ans: Dad tried to save the cat the first time using a ladder to reach it.

3. What was plan B?

Ans: Plan B was to swing himself up on a branch and reach the cat. However, the branch from which he was trying to swing, broke and he landed back on the deck.

4. Describe Plan C: Why did it fail?
