4. Why do you think the musicians and magicians are displaying their skills at the bazaar?

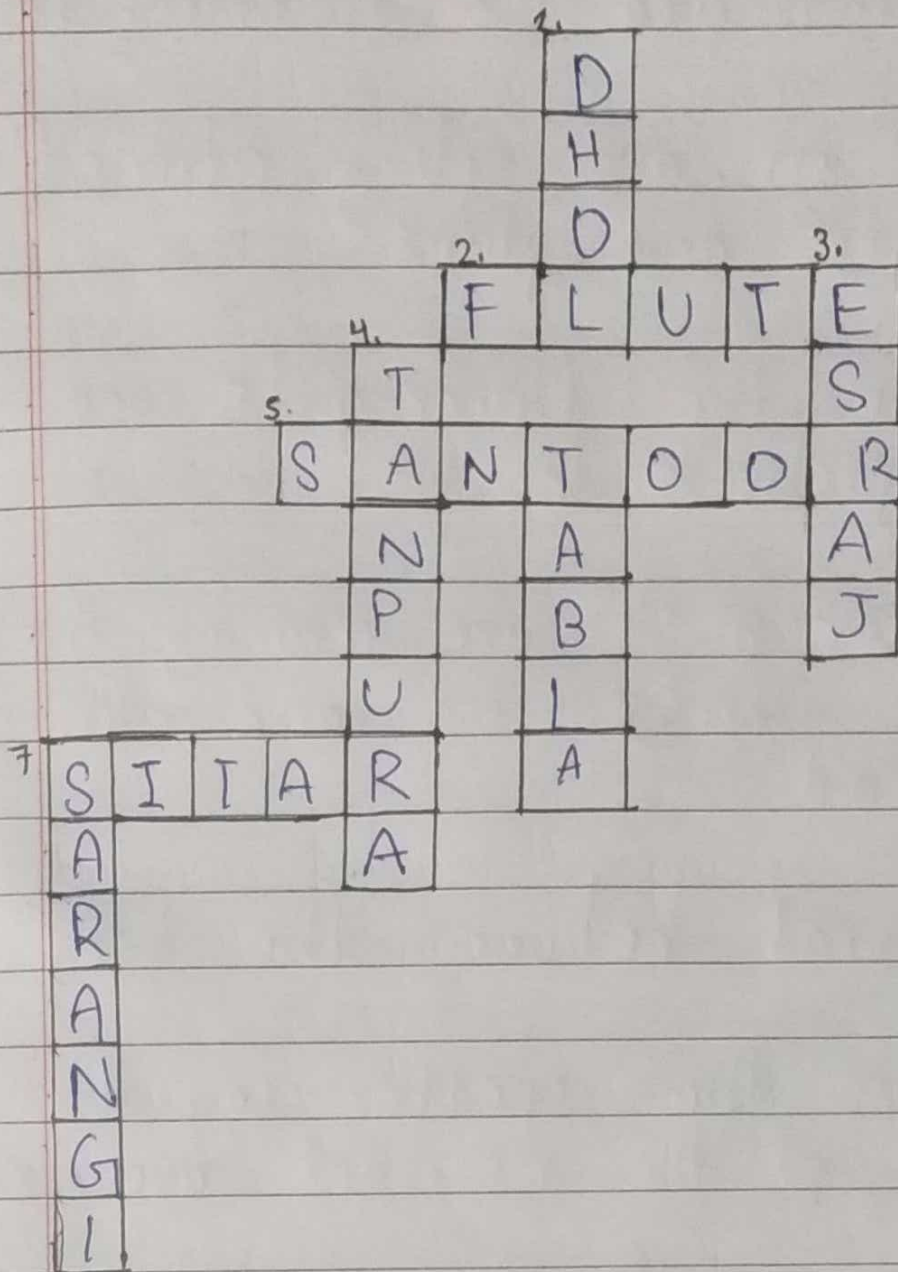
Ans - It is so because the musicians can make them joyful and relaxation while the magicians can make them horrified and then happy and with lots of excitement.
