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The unorganised sector is characterised by small and scattered units which are largely outside the control of the government. There are rules and regulations but they are not followed. Jobs here are low paid and not regular but they are not followed. Jobs here are low paid and not regular. Hence it is correct to say that workers are exploited in the unorganised sector because more work is taken from them in comparison to what they are paid. They have no provisions on extra pay for overtime and no medical benefits. The biggest problem in working in this sector is that there is no job security.

15 On the basis of the employment condition, the economy can be classified into two sectors.

1. Organised Sector: Enterprises, especially under the Government of India, have an employee-friendly environment and are provided with various facilities including high wages.

2. Unorganised Sector: Small and scattered units which are temporary and employees in this sector are paid less.

16 In the organised sector, the employees are given higher wages, medical facilities, a healthy working environment, and their jobs are permanent. They are not liable to look for a new source of income each day.

In the unorganised sector, the wages are low, the employees are employed for a short period, and their income is uncertain.

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
