Which lines in the poem tell you what whales were used for?

→ The lines "Lipstick for our painted faces, polish for our shoes" tell us that the whales are used for.

What are these lines describing?

→ The lines are describing the pain and helplessness of the whales that are crying about their plight, the exploitation by humans and fear of extinction. The use of sound conveys a sense of sadness in a whale which encourages us to also feel for the whale.

Why does the speaker describe it as 'keening'?

→ The word 'keening' creates an impression of pain or loss as high-pitched sounds are often associated with pain and grief. The whales are missing their friends and relatives as we humans keep on killing them for our greed. Thus, they sing the keening songs.
