Q16. Describe the life of workers in Victorian Britain or

The abundance of labours in the market affected the lives of the workers. Explain with example.

Ans For the workers the actual possibility of getting a job depended on existing networks of friendship and kin relations. If you had a relative or a friend in a factory, you were more likely to get a job quickly. But not everyone had social connections.

Job-seekers had to wait weeks, spending nights under bridges or in night shelters. Some stayed in Night Refuges that were set up by private individuals; others went to the ~~also~~ casual wards maintained by the Poor law authorities.

Seasonality of work in many industries meant prolonged periods without work.

Wages were lowered and the working hours were increased.
